PSHE Curriculum Statement



Our Intention is that...	<p>Our intention is that when children leave The Batt, they will do so with the knowledge, understanding and emotions to be able to play an active, positive and successful role in today's diverse society. We want our children to have high aspirations, a belief in themselves and realise that anything is possible if they put their mind to it. In an ever-changing world, it is important that they are aware, to an appropriate level, of different factors which will affect their world and that they learn how to deal with these so that they have good mental health and well-being.</p> <p>Our PSHE curriculum develops learning and results in the acquisition of knowledge and skills which will enable children to access the wider curriculum and prepare them to be a global citizen now and in their future roles within a global community. It promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils, preparing them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences for later life. Our Relationships and Sex Education enables our children to learn how to be safe, and to understand and develop healthy relationships, both now and in their future lives.</p>
Implementation	<p>PSHE is taught through a clear and comprehensive scheme of work in line with the National Curriculum. Pupils are taught PSHE using 'Jigsaw' which is a spiral, progressive scheme of work, which 'aims to prepare children for life, helping them to know and value who they are and understand how they relate to other people in this ever-changing world'. There is a strong emphasis on emotional literacy, building resilience and nurturing mental and physical health. As appropriate, sessions include mindfulness to allow children to advance their emotional awareness, concentration and focus.</p>

	<p>At The Batt, in addition to Relationships Education, we also teach aspects of Sex Education that are covered in our Science Curriculum. The Sex Education aspects of PSHE are also taught through the 'Jigsaw'.</p> <p>PSHE is taught through Jigsaw's six half termly themes with each year group studying the same unit at the same time (at their own level): Autumn 1: Being Me in My World Autumn 2: Differences (including anti-bullying) Spring 1: Dreams and Goals Spring 2: Healthy Me Summer 1: Relationships Summer 2: Changing Me (including Sex Education)</p> <p>It also identifies links to British Values, and SMSC and is taught in such a way as to reflect the overall vision, values, and ethos of our school.</p> <p>Each theme for each year group has a knowledge organiser to support teaching and learning and highlight fundamental knowledge and social and emotional skills children will develop.</p> <p>Learning experiences within PSHE are captured within class floor books in Years 1 to 3 and in individual books in Years 4 to 6.</p>
